Dear friends, partners and supporters of Childaid Network

in 15 years, we have been able to achieve a lot together. It is with satisfaction, that we present our annual report for 2021 in our anniversary year.

Serious consequences of the pandemic

Anyone who had expected normal processes to return in 2021 after the pandemic year 2020 was disappointed. Despite the rapid availability of vaccines, measures against the Covid-19 virus continued to shape life last year worldwide. Covid-19 had a massive and existential impact on the people in our project areas: young people died in many villages, and many have not yet recovered from the infections. Economic life was permanently disrupted. Schools have remained closed for 18 months only with short interruptions.

Our help is needed more than ever

The global community was well on its way to providing access to basic quality education for all children. In 2020 and 2021, however, there were major setbacks. While wealthy people in the cities were able to compensate for the loss of education for their children mostly through digital means, public education in our poor target regions was almost universally cancelled without replacement. Many third graders have never attended school because of Covid-19. Tenth graders lack the tools for their exams. Now, as the schools are reopening, many children are not coming back – and we are observing an alarming increase in child marriages, child trafficking and child labor.

Your project donations are impactful

In this situation, our project partners on the ground were particularly challenged. In 2021, they again tried to compensate for the lockdowns with a lot of energy and creativity. Small group teaching, television and radio broadcasts, as well as increasingly digital methods allowed our programs to continue to reach almost all children. What makes us particularly proud: in 2021 we doubled the reach of our projects. More than 100,000 young people now benefit from Childaid Network's educational programs. For our project activities in the pandemic we received special awards. Read more on pages 16 to 31.

Childaid Network – a sustainable organization

Thanks to your growing donations, we were able to increase our income and thus also the project funds by about 60%. Funding organizations, company networks and also grants from the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) contributed to this positive development. Despite the high growth in income and projects, we have not increased our cost base in 2021. We promise to continue to act in an economical, transparent, sustainable and impact-oriented manner. 




Project realization in close cooperation with the Childaid Network team


Houses of love

The loving care for former street children in the Snehalaya homes has been a focus of our support from the very beginning. Hundreds of them have now matured into young adults and started their own families. Many managed to graduate from university. These are hope-giving success stories.

2010

Education transformation

In regions with an illiteracy rate of 90%, we start with evening schools for young people without basic education. In hundreds of remote villages, tens of thousands have subsequently learned to read, write and calculate. Their cooperation and exemplary teamwork have contributed to the fact that primary schools are now also well-functioning.

2011

Lighting lights

Overcoming disadvantage, defying a lack of infrastructure, breaking the vicious circle of poverty – this is what our projects contribute to. Since 2011, we have enabled young people to acquire a vocational qualification of their choice in their region. We also support them on their way to become entrepreneurs. If electricity is not available, they even learn by candlelight.

2012

A network of solidarity

Young people invested their time and energy as volunteers on site, hundreds of journalists, advisors, media professionals and sponsors got to know the projects on their travels. Back home, they inspired others and motivated them to join in. For example, many associations in Königstein promoted Childaid Network in a campaign inspired by the author Erich Kästner.











School instead of child labor

Accompanied and supported by the campaign "F.A.Z. Leser-helfen", we have been intensifying our activities to make the city of Guwahati child-friendly since 2013. In 50 hotspots of the metropolis, almost all children are now enrolled in school. Further, there is support for the extremely needy children with tutoring and promotion of their holistic development.

2014

A future for refugee children

For decades, people in western Assam have been living in refugee camps without access to education, deprived of their homes by ethnic riots and unrest. For many children growing up there, we are setting up barefoot schools. We now enable the talented to attend high schools like the one in Amguri.

2015

Hope after the earthquakes

In 2015, strong earthquakes destroy many schools in Nepal and threaten the success of the project work taken over from "Kinder-von-Bhandar". Ten schools are quickly rebuilt earthquake-proof thanks to great solidarity. Today, structured project work helps to further improve learning outcomes.

2016

Interactive learning

Since around 2016, we have been very active in helping government schools in our project areas to better fulfil their educational mandate. We mobilize parents, encourage students, and train teachers so that teaching is fun and successful. This is achieved with a good degree of effectiveness, as is also proven by our DZI-seal, which has been awarded regularly to us since 2016.

2017

A heart for children

The trip of our ambassador Ursula Karven to the project areas and the invitation to the ZDF television gala brings us new donors throughout Germany and raises the publicity of Childaid Network. We use the momentum to expand our projects, enlarge our network and to improve the infrastructure, especially for children's homes.

2018

Engaged ambassador

ZDF television presenter Mitri Sirin supports our work with his reports from the project area in Northeast India. He and other ambassadors are a great reinforcement of Childaid Network's constantly expanding and predominantly volunteer team.













Learning for life

New vocational training centers and above all mobile teams that train young people in the villages in the trades of their choice strengthen our project work. Instead of dangerous, unprotected work underground or exploitative child labor, this enables a self-determined life.

2020

In the spotlight

Shortly before the Covid-19 related travel restrictions worldwide, Federal Minister Dr. Gerd Müller visits our child rights project in Guwahati and brings us a lot of attention. Competent partners and good relations with government agencies locally and in Germany are important for the growing support of our programs from BMZ.

2021

Defying the pandemic

Covid-19 hits people in our project areas hard. Long school closures, averaging 18 months, are impeding the progress of an entire generation. Our project partners are creatively and successfully trying to limit the damage with small group teaching, radio broadcasts and increasingly with digital channels.









Love and care

Young children suffer the most from the pandemic restrictions. We observe an increasing number of psychological disorders and more domestic violence. Our project partners try to compensate wherever possible.

Empower and encourage

Our goal is to train young people in their home regions so that they do not need to migrate but can earn an income locally and promote development. In 2021, we significantly expand the programs for this in Nepal as well as in Northeast India.

Innovatively closing learning gaps

Our largest project to date aims to help more than 100,000 students to close learning gaps created during the Covid-19 lockdowns as quickly as possible. For this, we rely on digital content that is age- and language-appropriate for our target groups as well as on our large network of local volunteers.

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Education is the key to life

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On the following pages, we present six selected projects. They are representative of 48 Childaid Network projects in particularly poor and disadvantaged regions.

We are currently working for around 100,000 young people in four countries and four project categories: school programs, vocational training, projects in support of children's rights and programs for health promotion.

Geographical focus for higher effectiveness

Our project work is focused on rural regions of South Asia: isolated Northeast India, disaster-prone northern Bangladesh and remote mountainous regions in Nepal. We

are also supporting the first small projects in northwestern Myanmar. Focus is important. Only then will it be possible to understand local conditions, develop sustainable partnerships and act effectively.

Emphasis on education

Content-wise, we also have a clear focus: We want to provide young people with access to education and training. That is the best investment in their future. We concentrate on disadvantaged marginalized groups like minorities, street children, refugees and rural youth in areas without infrastructure, the poorest of the poor, who would otherwise have no opportunities.

Our role as change agent

We do not create parallel structures and do not take on any tasks the state should fulfill. We see our role as initiating and accelerating change processes. Therefore, we offer bridging courses, exam support and tutoring for needy children, and accompany government schools in the often necessary improvement of teaching quality.

Sustainable and effective

What distinguishes our projects: careful planning and piloting, creative concepts, implementation with local partners involving civil society, effectiveness monitoring and intensive personal supervision by experts.







Q School programs

Good education is the key to sustainable change. Education prolongs life, reduces child mortality and significantly increases life income. But every second child worldwide still does not learn to read, write and do arithmetic. Childaid Network supports bridge courses and evening schools so that young people can catch up on the basic education they have missed. We accompany government schools in getting better. Since 2021, we have been working to close the learning gaps created by Covid-19.

Vocational training

In our project areas, many families are self-sufficient, but agriculture no longer provides enough food for the growing population. Young people are therefore attracted to relatively well-paid jobs as unskilled workers in the large southern cities or abroad. Childaid Network wants to slow down this exodus and therefore promotes the vocational qualification of young people in crafts or other professions that are in demand locally.

Ochildren's rights

Covid-19 has set us back massively in our efforts to realize children's rights for all. Almost all children in our project areas missed 18 months of school. Child labor, child trafficking and child marriages are on the rise again. Childaid Network supports projects that help children to obtain their rights in cooperation with civil society. We help to reduce child labor as well as early child marriage and aim to integrate children with disabilities as much as possible. We support children in homes or foster families if the family of origin cannot enable them to develop well.

Q Health promotion

Life expectancy in our project areas is about 20 years below the average in Germany. Children die of preventable diseases, people suffer from malnutrition at an early age. Children who are ill or hungry cannot study well either. Our projects promote children's health through better hygiene, better nutrition and other preventive measures.

Protect children's rights

Children in crisis

Children are the ones who suffer the most from the consequences of the Covid-19 crisis. Parents became unemployed, many children had to starve because of it. Street children are particularly at risk. In the slums of the big cities, people live from hand to mouth – without protection against infections.

Extraordinary engagement

In this situation, our partners were particularly in demand: people were dying in many villages, the government was overwhelmed. As in 2020, the partners took care of the emergency support for the people in our projects until help arrived. In 2021, we were also asked to provide educational materials to more than 80 orphanages and delivered oxygen incubators and masks where needed.

In emergency mode

In the homes, the children were cared for in the best possible way with tutorial courses and recreational programs, but mental illness was still on the rise. In the slums, we tried to compensate for the loss of education as much as we could. Especially in the countryside, in the refugee camps, and with the needy children, our help was demanded.

What is next

Securing children's rights, abolishing child labor, preventing abduction and child marriage are now more important than ever. During the pandemic the welfare of children is particularly at risk. With good partners, we will continue to expand our activities in 2022.



Priya and her sister Aroti came to Snehalaya children's home in Beltola in 2005. Their father had committed suicide – desperate because he was seriously ill and in debt due to unhealthy and exploitative living conditions. The mother could not take care of the five children alone.

Priya and her sister found a safe, secure place to grow up in the children's home. She lived there for 12 years, lovingly accompanied, individually supported in her interests such as dancing and painting. After graduating from high school, she successfully completed a two-year training course to become a nurse.

Today, Priya works in a large hospital as a permanent nurse and is financially independent. She supports her mother and siblings. At 25, she is a young, happy woman. In September 2021, Priya married her husband Durga in Guwahati, and they live together in Tezpur.

Support for pre-school children

Early practice

There is a folk wisdom that says: "You can't teach an old dog new tricks". Science confirms the importance of addressing all the senses early on for children's development. If small children are encouraged to explore and understand their environment, then learning processes succeed much more easily later on.

Realities of life

The hard life in the village communities of our project regions leaves little room for people to take care of the young children. The children in the village are left to fend for themselves when their parents work, often far away. Diseases are overlooked, nutrition is poor, development is hardly promoted.

Family is important

In order to do good for the children, parents are often tempted to send their children to a home or boarding school, especially when there is economic hardship. But parental love is indispensable. We therefore support the children at home wherever possible and help the village communities to organize qualified early childhood education in day care centers, kindergartens and Montessori centers on a decentralized basis.

What happens next

We are now supporting several hundred preschools and children's centers in rural regions of South Asia in close cooperation with government agencies and are continuing to expand further on.



Mona is 18 years old today. When her father died and the family had no income, she was admitted to the children's home – only four years old. Mona remembers good times there, but also difficult ones. She is still sad that she did not receive enough parental love and protection when she needed it most.

With the help of our partner organization "Forget Me Not", Mona was able to return to her family in 2019. The return was well prepared and closely accompanied. Social workers assessed the family situation, individual support was provided, and all family members receive psychological counseling. Mona was able to continue her secondary education and even to support her younger siblings in their education.

Today, she is a self-confident young woman, who likes to pass on her own experiences: as a community change agent, she explains to parents how important it is for their children to grow up in a family environment. She loves children and wants to become a teacher. We are happy to continue supporting her on her way.

Evening schools as a second chance

Gaps in basic education

Even though most children in our project areas are now enrolled in school, many learn too little due to the poor quality of government schools. Too many drop out of school early. The Covid-19 crisis has further widened the gaps in education, partly because many young people have to go to work instead of school.

A second chance

We give young people a second chance in evening schools. In addition to reading, writing and arithmetic, they are also taught essentials about hygiene, health and higher-yield cultivation methods. During the lockdowns, some courses could be continued under certain conditions. We established substitute classes with home teachers as well as outdoor classes. Demand was high.

Holistic development

Our holistic approach works: in three to four years, the young people grow into self-confident personalities. Later, many take on leadership roles in their villages.

Involve civil society

We involve civil society in the projects through accompanying village education councils. These, in turn, mobilize young people, organize classroom buildings, address the authorities and take care of the improvement of the elementary schools. Our goal is to make ourselves superfluous. This has already been achieved in many hundreds of villages.



Wanki comes from a poor family with many children. When he was nine years old, his father, a day laborer, died. Wanki never attended school as he had to work from an early age to support the family. His job prospects were bleak. A second chance opened up for Wanki in 2015 with our evening school program. He caught up on his basic education until 2019. His teachers where impressed by how he developed. Today he writes his own poems and songs.

Enthusiastic about football, he wanted to become a professional referee. He succeeded: in the meantime, he is a sought-after referee of the district teams. As sports secretary of the local football club, he improved the training conditions considerably and is intensively engaged in youth work. Due to his experience in dealing with the local administration, he is currently involved in the construction of the new community center.

In the meantime, Wanki himself supports the evening school to help children. Now 28, he is a valued leader and an inspiration to many local young people.

Emergency aid for education

In 2021, Childaid Network staff and partners continued to maintain the educational opportunities for all children in our projects as much as possible, despite Covid-19. Thanks to the great additional team commitment, much was achieved.

Creativity required

Where electricity is unreliable and smartphones are rare, digital teaching is difficult. Our project teams had to develop alternatives: open-air classes, small group lessons with volunteers, and teachers who became radio hosts. We are very proud of what we have achieved during this difficult time. We have been able to provide regular educational content to over 80% of "our" young people. But there are so many others who have been left alone.

Education crisis

The 2020 to 2021 pandemic destroyed hard-won progress towards providing children with a good basic education. Children in government schools are missing more than a full year of education due to long school closures. Many will never return to school without special measures taken.

What is next

We therefore doubled our project reach and are now helping students in 1,000 villages to close their learning gaps.



Rosemary grew up in a bamboo hut in the jungle with her parents, who had never attended school, along with her two siblings. The family belongs to the ethnic group of the Santhals, who had to flee to the forests on the border to Bhutan in 1996 after violent conflicts. There, they survived meagrely on self-cultivation on land they have cleared themselves. Even 25 years later, there are no infrastructure investments and no government schools.

Rosemary was lucky. Childaid Network set up barefoot schools for the Santhals and other minorities and then the lighthouse school in Amguri with boarding, where she was able to attend kindergarten at an early age. After ten years at school, she was one of the first of her ethnic group to pass the matric exam and transferred to St. Ann's College with our scholarship. There, she was among the best in the matriculation examination and was awarded a prize by the Government of Assam.

Rosemary's greatest wish is to become a lawyer to fight for the Santhals against injustice and oppression. For this goal, she is currently studying at the college in Kokrajhar.

Health promotion

Medicine is a luxury

What we take for granted – midwifery, checkups, vaccinations, dental care and basic medical care – is often a luxury for the children in our project areas. Doctors are day trips away. The health posts are undersupplied.

Need-based program

Our analysis in Ramechhap (Nepal) in 2019 had revealed the dramatic malnutrition of many children and the wide spread of preventable diseases. Based on this, we have initiated a program to sustainably improve the health situation for people throughout the region. During the Covid-19 crisis, this was further extended.

Challenged in the crisis

Our teams took the lead in educating people about the risks and prevention of Covid-19 infections. At the request of the government, we supplied the health stations throughout Ramechhap with protective equipment and supported them in their daily work. Nevertheless, the Covid-19 virus claimed many victims in our project regions unfortunately.

What is next

The BMZ and reliable funding partners are helping us with funds and expertise to continue expanding the programs in 2022. Our mobile teams can now start again to bring sustainable changes in behavior by visting schools and attending group meetings.



Hem, 17 years old, lives in a village community in Umakunda together with her parents and seven sisters. She currently attends grade 10 with pleasure and commitment.

When she got her period for the first time at the age of 15, her sisters educated her. Culturally, women and girls in Nepal were considered unclean during menstruation and were not allowed to leave the house. The issue is still stigmatised today although discrimination against women has been prohibited since 2005 and criminalised since 2017.

As part of our health promotion project, Hem became part of a girls' group at her school. There, the girls are taught everything about menstrual hygiene. They receive free feminine hygiene products and learn to talk openly about their problems and needs. In the meantime, she comes to school without fear during her period: "My class has become a better place for girls, we even feel supported by the boys and the teachers."



Qualify

In our project areas, agriculture no longer feeds all people. Lacking professional qualifications, young people are left in unemployment or casual labor. Therefore, many migrate to the metropolises or abroad. To create livelihoods and slow down migration, Childaid Network has been investing in vocational training since 2010.

Demand-driven

With our course offers, we meet the wishes of the young people. Our decentralized training approach is successful: we go to the villages with mobile teams and the necessary teaching materials. This saves costs. And it improves the chances of earning an income, as we train in the sectors that are in demand locally.

Independent

Some work as employees after being qualified. Many of our graduates try to start a small business. We promote this with start-up financing, encourage the formation of cooperatives and offer support to plan for and establish a business.

What is next

Through digital teaching aids, films and internet courses, we try to constantly improve the quality of the training. We successfully integrate potential local employers: they contribute their know-how, practical knowledge and even teachers to our training courses free of charge. In 2022, we will greatly expand these programs.



Bimal came to one of our Snehalaya homes in Guwahati in 2007 when he was eight years old. His father had died when he was six and his mother could no longer feed and take care of the three siblings alone. Bimal was lovingly integrated and able to attend a good school. With some extra tuition and the personal and motivating care of Father Lukose, he achieved his school-leaving certificate.

When they turn 18, young people have to leave the children's homes according to Indian law. However, we continue to accompany them. Bimal passed the certificate as a Yamaha two-wheeler mechanic with very good grades at the vocational training center we support in Maligaon. In his family, he is the first to graduate from high school and complete vocational training. He is very proud of this.

Today, Bimal is a content young man. He has a permanent job in Bangalore, earns well and can even support his siblings in their education. His wish is to open his own workshop in his home community. We will continually support him with this as much as we can.

Increase in revenue – growing trust

Record donations

With € 4.071 million (adjusted to € 4.06 million after deducting business activities, see table p. 47, previous year € 2.51 million), Childaid Network 2021 shows a significant increase in total income. Although sponsorship activities suffered from the pandemic, donations and other income increased by more than 60%.

Growing network

The good donation outcome is the result of further deepening trust and of winning new funding partners as well as the expansion of the donor network, especially within allied companies. In addition, the BMZ grants have grown proportionally.


Lean cost structure

The year shows a slight increase in costs for project support, administration, public relations and donor support with expenses of € 300,211.43 (previous year € 293,574.52). As a percentage of income according to the DZI definition, however, the cost ratios in Germany continued to fall.

Further expansion of the projects

The project expenditures in 2021 amounted to € 3.02 million (previous year € 1.93 million), an increase of 57%.

Growing substance

With € 3,846,560.92 (previous year € 3,083,121.28) Childaid Network shows an increase in the balance sheet total of almost 25% as of 31.12.2021. The foundation's substance was strengthened in 2021 primarily through further free reserves in order to be able to grant medium-term project commitments and compensate for fluctuations in income in the future.

High project liabilities

The liabilities are mainly BMZ grants that were received in 2021, but where investment can only be implemented in 2022, mainly due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Foundation capital

The foundation's capital was increased to \in 865,500 by a further endowment, which is not subject to the maintenance of capital rules.


Supervision and non-profit status


Childaid Network was recognised as a foundation with legal capacity by the Darmstadt Regional Council on 27 April 2007 with AZ I 13-25d 04/11-(4)-146. The Bad Homburg tax office regularly confirms the foundation's charitable status, most recently on September 13, 2021.

Audit of the annual accounts

Childaid Network voluntarily submits to various external audits. The annual financial statement of the Childaid Network Foundation for the financial year was again audited by the auditing company Baker Tilly GmbH & Co KG, Frankfurt. On March 29, 2022, they issued an unqualified audit opinion. The DZI audits processes and expenditures according to transparent criteria.

Key figures and analysis

Focused project work

Investments in projects for children and young people significantly expanded in 2021 despite the Covid-19 burdens. In particular, projects for primary and vocational education in Northeast India greatly increased.

Wide reach for marginalized groups

With the four main project pillars (school programs, children's rights, vocational training and health promotion), about 100,000 young people are now directly supported, a twofold as compared to 2020. We focus especially on children and young people from disadvantaged marginalized groups such as minorities, refugees and rural youth, who otherwise have no access to education.


Principles for use of funds

The majority of our funds are used to pay for teachers and social workers and their training. Once again, we provided emergency aid on a smaller scale. In addition to our projects, 80,000 young people were provided with educational materials, protective material and food.

Our trademark – a lean cost structure

Our administrative costs of almost € 66,000 in the reporting year were 1.62% (previous year 2.57%) of income. The costs for donor support, including public relations, amounted to approximately € 104,000 and were thus 2.57% (previous year 4.71%) of the income. Overall, we spent only 4,18% of income for proper administrative handling and monitoring of our activities.

Great honorary commitment

Our administration cost is low because our foundation work is mainly carried out by volunteers. Management board, foundation council, editorial staff, graphic designers, part of the project support, web design and many other tasks are being carried out by unpaid experts. A benevolent company provides us with an office free of charge. Auditors, banks and suppliers grant us preferential conditions.

Closing gaps in education

Generous sponsors support our ambitious program to help more than 100,000 young people in 1,000 villages to compensate for the consequences of school closures. For our partners and us, this project is a great challenge. But the demand is much higher. To achieve our goals, we are

looking for more donors. Also, we are working hard to convince local governments of our concepts so that they support the implementation in their region as much as possible.

Vocational training

For more than ten years, we have been helping young people to acquire vocational qualifications to enable them to uplift themselves, their families and other employees out of poverty. Based on our proven concepts and funded by BMZ, we will be able to greatly expand our training programs in Northeast India and Nepal with two new initiatives in 2022. Tens of thousands of young people will benefit from this. For this, we are asking for further support for our own share of BMZ project budgets.

Our large child rights project in western Assam aims to protect children in hundreds of villages.

Child labor, trafficking and child marriages are unfortunately on the rise again. We want to enable all young people to attend school and develop healthily. After a successful pilot project, we want to expand this project organizationally and financially in 2022.
