Dear friends, partners and supporters of Childaid Network

despite all the challenges, we mastered 2023 well. We are delighted to present to you our report on this exciting year.

State of emergency in education

Good basic education is a fundamental human right. Yet the UNESCO World Education Report 2022 documents that still only one in five children in South Asia learns to read and do arithmetic properly. This is a declaration of incompetency in respect of the global community. Inadequate teacher qualification, the multilingual learning groups and the lack of good learning materials – all contribute to this appalling result. In view of this need, our mission to give all boys and girls access to quality education remains of utmost importance.

Another year of crisis

Inflationary prices for food and basic supplies put a strain on our target groups. The positive economic development in the metropolitan areas further improved the opportunities of the wealthy. However, the poor people in our project areas often suffered from flooding and crop failures because of climate change. In addition, we experienced that the Indian government's efforts to regulate civil society activities more strictly gave us and our partners an opportunity to learn and adopt quickly to the demands of the time.

Proven project concepts

We can now look back on 17 years of successful project work. In-depth experience, established partnerships and consolidated networks help us to successfully tackle the difficulties in our project areas. We are pleased that there is now more local support which we can integrate into our work. Increasingly, we are also succeeding in using innovative digital technologies to bring expertise and learning support to remote areas at low cost. Overall, the efficiency and reach of our programs continue to grow. Read more about our project work on pages 16 to 31.

Difficulties spur us on

The situation in India in 2023 meant that we were unable to access some of the funding we had been promised and some contributions from our network were lost. In addition, wars and inflation reduced the volume of donations available for our purposes. As a result, both our income and project funds invested fell in 2023 compared to the previous year. However, we do not get discouraged. We are positioning ourselves in a way that we can continue to give a growing number of young people better prospects for their lives. 

Sources of funds 2023



Education is the key to life

On the following pages, we present six selected projects. They are representative of 50 Childaid Network projects in particularly poor and disadvantaged regions.

We are currently working for around 200,000 young people in four countries and four project categories: school programs, vocational training, projects in support of children's rights and programs for health promotion.

Geographical focus for higher effectiveness

Our project work is focused on rural regions of South Asia: isolated Northeast India, disaster-prone northern Bangladesh and

remote mountainous regions in Nepal. We are also supporting the first small projects in Myanmar. Focus is important. Only then will it be possible to understand local conditions, develop sustainable partnerships and act effectively.

Emphasis on education

Content-wise, we also have a clear focus: We want to provide young people with access to education and training. That is the best investment in their future. We concentrate on disadvantaged marginalized groups like minorities, street children, refugees and rural youth in areas without infrastructure, the poorest of the poor, who would otherwise have no opportunities.

Our role as change agent

We do not create parallel structures and do not take on any tasks the state should fulfill. We see our role as initiating and accelerating change processes. Therefore, we offer bridging courses, exam support and tutoring for needy children, and accompany government schools in the often necessary improvement of teaching quality.

Sustainable and effective

What distinguishes our projects: careful planning and piloting, creative concepts, implementation with local partners involving civil society, effectiveness monitoring and intensive personal supervision by experts.







School programs

Good education is the key to sustainable change. Education prolongs life, reduces child mortality and significantly increases lifetime income. But every second child worldwide still does not learn to read, write and do arithmetic. Childaid Network supports bridge courses and evening schools so that young people can catch up on the basic education they have missed. We accompany government schools in getting better. Since 2021, we have been working to close the learning gaps created by COVID-19.

Q Vocational training

In our project areas, many families are self-sufficient, but agriculture no longer provides enough food for the growing population. Young people are therefore attracted to relatively well-paid jobs as unskilled workers in the large southern cities or abroad. Childaid Network wants to slow down this exodus and therefore promotes the vocational qualification of young people in crafts or other professions that are in demand locally.

Children's rights

COVID-19 has set us back massively in our efforts to realize children's rights for all. Almost all children in our project areas missed 18 months of school. Child labor, child trafficking and child marriages are on the rise again. Childaid Network supports projects that help children to obtain their rights in cooperation with civil society. We help to reduce child labor as well as early child marriage and aim to integrate children with disabilities as much as possible. We support children in homes or foster families if the family of origin cannot enable them to develop well.

Health promotion

Life expectancy in our project areas is about 20 years below the average in Germany. Children die of preventable diseases, people suffer from malnutrition at an early age. Children who are ill or hungry cannot study well either. Our projects promote children's health through better hygiene, better nutrition and other preventive measures.

Support for preschool children

Early practice

We all know: Children learn from birth. A safe, stimulating environment is important for good development. Science confirms the importance of early stimulation of all senses: if young children are encouraged to explore and understand their environment, learning processes are much easier later on.

Realities of life

The hard life in the village communities in our project regions leaves little room for people to look after the young children. The children in the village are left to fend for themselves when their parents work, often far away. Illnesses are overlooked, nutrition is inadequate and intellectual development is hardly encouraged.

Family is important

To help their children, parents are often tempted to place them in a home or boarding school, especially when there is economic hardship at home. However, integration into family life is irreplaceable, which is why we advise and support the families. We help the village communities to organize qualified early childhood support through preschools, kindergartens, and Montessori centers on a decentralized basis.

What happens next

We now support several hundred preschools and children's centers in rural regions of South Asia – in close cooperation with the local government – and will continue to expand these projects.



Pujan started pre-school at the age of four. He found it difficult to socialize. He often cried and was very quiet. He rarely played with his classmates. His parents hardly looked after him.

Our partner has been supporting Pujan's school since 2019, providing support and training for teachers and parents. In the beginning, his teacher had little access to Pujan. With guidance, she encouraged him to communicate more with his classmates and express his feelings. The regular meetings also improved the support from the parents – Pujan soon came to school well cared for and well looked after.

Pujan developed into an outgoing, happy boy who enjoys playing with his friends. Pujan's mother is surprised at how well Pujan now communicates. She is very grateful that she has been helped to be a supportive mother to her son.

After the pandemic – closing learning gaps

Educational crisis

We are still dealing with the consequences of the pandemic. Hard-won educational progress has been destroyed. The children in our project areas have missed more than a whole year of education due to long school closures. Many have been completely lost to the education system and have not returned to school.

100,000 pupils benefited

In our projects, we were able to compensate for the worst consequences of the pandemic thanks to the hard work of our project staff. In addition, we have been providing support for many pupils at state schools since 2021. In collaboration with experienced partners and local governments, we were active for over 100,000 pupils in 2023 – a mammoth task.

Innovation

There were no role models, but our teams are highly committed and innovative. We were able to mobilize many local volunteers for tutoring courses. Teachers can achieve more with child-centered learning methods that take into account the different learning levels. Overall, we measure good learning progress.

What happens next

The program is now gradually transforming into a school quality program. We have also launched similar activities in Nepal, which we are expanding.



Amyra lives with her five siblings and her parents and is one of the few children in the village to attend 4th grade at elementary school. Due to school closures during the pandemic, she had difficulty following lessons and her performance continued to deteriorate.

Our project partner worked at Amyra's school to close the educational gaps caused by the pandemic. Using special learning materials, educational games and outdoor learning techniques, the staff helped Amyra to overcome her shyness, ask questions and catch up. Amyra now participated more in lessons, improved her reading skills, and quickly learned basic arithmetic.

Today, Amyra is motivated and enthusiastic. She helps her classmates with reading and writing and is happy that this is easier for her today. She says that the patience, understanding, and methods of the project partner have helped her a lot.

Promote, enable, encourage

Right to education

The right to a good, free education is enshrined in law for all children in our project areas. Official statistics show an impressive school enrolment rate of 97 %. Does this make our work superfluous?

Learning success staggering

This seemingly good news masks other figures: Around 50 % of sixth graders are still unable to read simple texts. The main reasons for this are poorly trained teachers and inadequate equipment. Teachers are often absent altogether.

Catalyst

Childaid Network cannot and does not want to relieve the state of its responsibility to provide all children with a good education and will not set up parallel systems. We have a catalytic effect, with proven success. We now support over 1,400 state schools in four countries. In this way, we are improving the quality of education in the long term and ensuring greater educational equality.

Mobilizing communities

In addition, we strengthen the social environment: we finance social workers, support the parents, and ensure that the children attend school regularly. We organize tutoring and motivating leisure programs. Teachers are supported with further training and better teaching materials. Civil society recognizes that education is important. Our lobbying work leads to the government providing more resources.



The youngest of three siblings, eleven-year-old Nasima lives with her poor family in a small village in Bangladesh. She attended the 5th grade in the neighboring village. Her parents had run up huge debts to pay for her disabled brother's therapy. Due to her father's serious illness, Nasima had to work and drop out of school.

Our partner's social workers tried to find a solution for the family. They provided information about possible help. The parents received advice on how they could better manage family work to enable Nasima to attend school. The school committee also approached the local school authorities with a request for support for the family.

As a result, the authorities gave Nasima a bicycle. This enables her to travel to school faster and still run errands for the family. Nasima is overjoyed: "The bike gave me my books and my friends back. The bike gets me everywhere quickly, like a butterfly."

Protect children's rights

Children in crisis

Millions of children around the world are suffering from the consequences of war and environmental disasters. In 2023, floods destroyed large parts of the harvests in South Asia. Poor families, who were already living on the breadline, lacked basic necessities, especially money for food and medical treatment. Education was not a priority for many.

Emergency situation


In existential emergencies, children are sometimes abandoned, sold, or enslaved. Some parents are helpless and themselves become victims of criminals who profit from their hardship. We know many harrowing examples from our own surveys: Most girls are married off underage and have to work. 95 % of children with disabilities do not go to school.

Changing structures

Our partners identify the problems, look for allies, educate and work towards sustainable structural change. The state is interested in improvements, but often lacks the expertise and budget.

How to continue

Our work: securing children's rights, abolishing child labor, integrating young people with disabilities, preventing abduction and child marriage is more important than ever. We have planned a major project for Assam and hope that we can implement it.



Panama lived with her family in a small village in mountainous Nepal. The family could not feed themselves from their own harvest. The parents therefore sent the siblings to a children's home in Kathmandu. Panama was taken to her grandmother.

In orphanages, children are often exposed to physical and psychological violence. They suffer from being separated from their home, including Panama's siblings. Our project partner tried to provide practical help for the family. The aim was to enable the children to return home and attend school. Intensive discussions convinced the family to bring the children back. At the same time, the partner organized the necessary school materials and other assistance.

Panama is now successfully attending the 2nd grade of elementary school. She is very happy that they are back together as a family. Her situation serves as an inspiration for others in the village to also support their children in a family context.

"The program to support the children of our partner Himalayan Innovative Society in the bitterly poor high Himalayan district of Humla in Nepal achieved great success. Unstable families were helped to find solutions to prevent the children from being separated from their families. Through child rights committees and essential support, this initiative has truly made a significant difference in their lives."



Qualification and income for a better future

Vocational training

Faster processes of change endanger livelihoods. In our project areas, for example, agriculture no longer feeds everyone. Without special qualifications, young people are often left with only odd jobs or labor migration. To improve life chances, we invest in vocational training.

Demand-driven

Our courses are geared towards the wishes of young people and the needs of the region. Our decentralized training approach is successful: we go to the villages with mobile teams and equipment. This saves costs, and creates new opportunities locally.

Self-employed

Some work as employees after qualifying, but jobs are few and far between. That is why many of our graduates try their hand at small-scale entrepreneurship. We promote this with start-up funding, encourage the formation of cooperatives and offer support with business planning and start-ups.

What is next

We are constantly improving the quality of training through digital teaching materials, films, and lots of practical exercises. We successfully integrate local employers: they contribute their practical knowledge and even teachers to our training courses free of charge. We are expanding these programs further in 2024.



Lalita and her family lived mainly from seasonal agricultural work. The family income was barely enough. That's why Lalita was looking for additional income.

Lalita signed up for training provided by our partner Aide & Action. There she learned how to make products from bamboo and sugar cane, how to package them attractively, and how to market them.

Lalita invested a small amount of money to start production. She developed designs that were in high demand. The establishment of her small business was closely monitored and supported by our project staff.

In the meantime, Lalita has founded her own company with two other women and is working on expanding her product range. Lalita is very satisfied: "Thanks to the help and support I received I was able to set up my own business. I want to expand it so that I can provide for myself and my family."

Health promotion

Medicine is a luxury

In Germany, we offer medical care, health checkups, support during childbirth, vaccinations and dentistry across the board. For the children in our project areas, this is a luxury. Medical professionals and hospitals are difficult to reach in an emergency due to the distances involved. Local health stations are poorly equipped.

Improving basic care

Our expert analysis of the situation in Ramechhap (Nepal) in 2019 revealed the malnutrition of many children and the widespread prevalence of preventable diseases. Our project concept to fundamentally improve the health situation was quickly implemented and was very important during the pandemic.

Focus on prevention

Even after the pandemic, our local teams are in high demand and are committed to educating people about the risks and prevention of infections. At the request of the government, we are helping health centers throughout Ramechhap to improve their daily work. Preventive healthcare programs are being systematically set up in schools.

What happens next

The BMZ and reliable funding partners are helping us with funds and expertise to continue the programs in 2024. Our mobile teams are active in more than 170 schools and are bringing about sustainable changes in behavior.



Rita (47) lives with her family in a remote village in Nepal. She had her first child when she was 18. After the home birth of her third child, she suffered from unexplained complaints, yet she did not seek medical help.

Rita became part of our project partner's mothers' group. The women there also discuss health issues. Rita realized that many women have similar complaints to her own. Her uterine prolapse was diagnosed and the project partner's staff encouraged her to seek professional help. After three months, her symptoms had disappeared.

Rita is very grateful to the project partner's staff that the condition was diagnosed with their help and was therefore treatable. Rita now tells other women about her experience and hopes to encourage women in her community to have regular health check-ups.


Alliances with like-minded people in Germany

Our strength is that we are on the ground. We interact personally with our partners. We work together as partners, often on a friendship basis, to achieve success.





A difficult year

Consolidation

At € 3.65 million (previous year: € 4.54 million), Childaid Network 2023 reported a reduction in total income of almost 20 %. Due to the political situation in India, promised funding could not be drawn down. Other donation income also suffered in the crisis.

Reliable network

However, the reduced donation result is not a reflection of a decline in trust. New funding partners were also acquired in 2023. Fundraising campaigns were carried out reliably. Most of the BMZ's grant commitments were only postponed.


Lean cost structure

The expense ratio increased due to the fall in income and strategic investments (see table on p. 47). This trend will reverse in 2024 as income increases. It was possible to strengthen the investment regrouping reserve through capital gains.

Reduced project investments

Project expenditure in 2023 amounted to € 3.09 million (previous year: € 3.94 million), a reduction of over 20%. In 2023, reliable project transfers to our main project region of Northeast India were hampered. Growth in other regions is progressing as planned but cannot yet compensate for these shortfalls.

Growing substance

At € 4,449,272.68 (previous year: € 3,940,421.41), Childaid Network once again reported an increase in total assets for December 31, 2023. The foundation's substance was strengthened in 2023 primarily through high liquid reserves, as funds could not be transferred into the projects as planned.

High project liabilities

The liabilities are mainly BMZ grants received in 2023, where investment can only be implemented in 2024.

Foundation capital

The endowment capital remained unchanged.

Supervision and non-profit status

Childaid Network was recognized as a foundation with legal capacity by the Darmstadt State of Hesse Administration Office on April 27, 2007 with AZ I 13-25d 04/11(4)-146. The Bad Homburg tax office regularly confirms the foundation's charitable status, most recently on December 12, 2023.


Bylaws

Childaid Network revised its bylaws in 2022. The new version was approved by the Darmstadt State of Hesse Administration Office in March of 2023. The changes mainly concern a strengthening of the division of powers between the Foundation Council and the Management Board and certain adaptations to the new foundation law. The new bylaws are available on the website.

Audit of the annual accounts

Childaid Network voluntarily submits to various external audits. The annual financial statement of the Childaid Network Foundation for the financial year was again audited by Baker Tilly GmbH & Co KG, Frankfurt. On March 28, 2024, they issued an unqualified audit opinion. The DZI audits processes and expenditures according to transparent criteria.

Upon request, we shall be happy to send interested parties the auditor's report, the annual financial statements, or the expert opinion of the German Central Institute for Social Matters (DZI). The documents are also available on our website.





Key figures and analysis

Extended project work

Despite investing reduced funds, the scope of the projects was significantly increased in 2023. In particular, the projects for basic education and vocational training in Northeast India and Nepal were further expanded with the help of local contributions.

Wide reach for marginalized groups

With the four main project pillars (school programs, children's rights, vocational training, and health promotion), more than 200,000 young people are now directly supported, a fourfold increase compared to 2020. We focus particularly on children and young people from disadvantaged marginalized groups such as ethnic minorities, internally displaced persons and people in rural regions and areas affected by natural disasters.



Finally, I am impressed by the efficiency: a ratio of just a few percent for administration, donor support and public relations is exemplary. That is why I am very, very happy to support Childaid Network."

Principles for use of funds

Most of our funds are used to pay teachers and social workers and provide them with further training. 2023, we also passed on smaller budgets for organizations from our network, such as for the earthquake victims in Turkey.



Continued - a lean cost structure

Our administrative costs amounted to around € 111,000 in the reporting year, or 3 % (previous year: 1.9 %), while the costs for donor support including public relations amounted to around € 144,000, or 4% (previous year: 2.3 %) of total income. Overall, we spent 7 % of total income on the proper administrative handling and monitoring of our activities in accordance with DZI accounting standards last year (previous year: 4.2 %) due to lower income and structural investments, but this still puts us amongst the best organizations monitored by DZI.

Great honorary commitment

Our administration cost is low because our foundation work is mainly carried out by volunteers. Management Board, Foundation Council, editorial staff, graphic designers, part of the project coordination work, web design and many other tasks are carried out by unpaid experts. A benevolent company provides us with office space free of charge. Auditors, banks, and suppliers grant us preferential conditions.

What comes next? A brief outlook for 2024

Our work is not getting any easier. We are too small to change global trends. But we are big enough to be agile and innovative in finding good solutions for our target groups. We will not be discouraged. A strong network, long-term funding commitments from strong partners and our proven local structures continue to provide a reliable basis for good projects.

Changed country focus

India's economy is growing dynamically, and the country has more of its own resources for development. We are trying to integrate these resources but continue to support the projects in an advisory capacity. Our aim there is to help local partners implement changes and improvements with reduced financial support from us. On the other hand, we want to further expand programs for needy regions in rural Nepal and northern Bangladesh. Unfortunately, the civil war in Myanmar is preventing us from implementing the urgently needed projects there.

Quality education

Our corona learning gap projects are transforming into programs for school quality. With the support of parents, innovative teaching methods and good materials, lots of teacher training and advocacy work, we are seeing success. We continue to scale this up and achieve sustainable improvements with strong partners and committed local governments. We are delighted to have received new long-term funding commitments for this, but still need support with our own contributions.

Vocational training

For 15 years, we have been helping young people to acquire vocational qualifications, e.g. in the construction or hairdressing trades or in the catering industry. In 2024, we are particularly strengthening projects in which young people can generate local income, e.g. through improved agricultural practices. This helps them to become better rooted in the region, reducing migration. We are also asking for further support for this.

Making children's rights a reality

Realizing children's rights, preventing child labor and child marriages, integrating people with disabilities, strengthening girls in their self-confidence and preparing them for a self-determined life – these remain the core topics of our work. We promote the empowerment of local communities and disadvantaged groups. For the protection of those affected, we cannot report in detail on all programs.
