Dear friends, partners, and supporters of Childaid Network,

We are delighted to share with you this report on a successful year 2025. As always, it provides a comprehensive and transparent overview of our achievements, the growth of our team, and the changes within our projects.

Taking on challenges

Hardly a day goes by without troubling news. Around the world, there is a growing tendency to abandon agreements and withdraw from global partnerships. Narrow – and often short-sighted – national interests are coming to the fore. The uncertainty this creates impoverishes us all. Efforts to promote justice and quality education, on the other hand, are progressing only slowly. But we should not underestimate the power of civil society engagement. In Nepal and Bangladesh, the younger generation led protests against corruption and poor governance in 2024 and 2025, paving the way for a more accountable democratic process and calling for necessary reforms. They now need our support on the path to a better future!

Driving change with partners

Our goal has always been to mobilize local resources and serve as a catalyst for sustainable, far-reaching change. We are making real progress: For the first time, in 2025 we invested more project funds in Nepal than in India. With new partners and in close cooperation with the government, we are expanding our project regions in this country. In India, we have partnered with a national movement that works directly with state governments and utilizes their budgets to drive systemic improvements in education quality. Read more about this in this annual report.

High-quality projects

The COVID-19 pandemic has left a lasting mark. Globally, learning outcomes are declining measurably, and shrinking budgets at international organizations are putting essential programs under pressure. We are also finding that our partners increasingly need support in strengthening their planning and implementation capabilities to drive improvements effectively and at scale. As we grow and expand into new regions, our projects are becoming more ambitious. We also connect partners with one another and set high standards for quality. Organizational agility

Despite a decline in federal grants, 2025 was another year of growth for Childaid Network, driven primarily by the steadfast support of our donors, funding partners, and major fundraising campaigns. We were also able to strengthen our team, our network, and our projects – all while keeping our cost structure exceptionally lean. 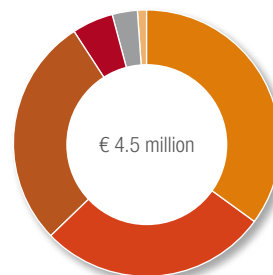

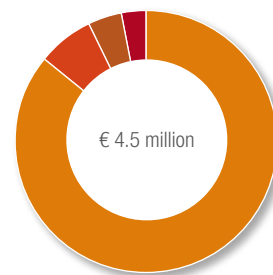
Project realization in close cooperation

Focus on girls

Across our project regions – regardless of religious background – girls are still frequently expected to help with household chores and care for younger siblings. Ensuring they attend school regularly and succeed in their studies requires dedicated encouragement for both girls and their families.

Bright prospects

Across South Asia, young people are increasingly vocal about the lack of opportunities in the labor market. Many are choosing to emigrate. By offering vocational training and entrepreneurship coaching, we are helping to create pathways to a self-determined life close to home.

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Education is the key to life

On the following pages, we present six selected projects. They are representative of 50 Childaid Network projects in particularly poor and disadvantaged regions.

We are currently working for around 200,000 young people in four countries and four project categories: school quality programs, vocational training, children's protection projects and programs for health promotion.

Geographical focus for higher effectiveness

Our project work is focused on rural regions of South Asia: outlying Northeast India, disaster-prone northern Bangladesh and

remote mountainous regions in Nepal. We are also supporting small projects in Myanmar. Focus is important. Only then will it be possible to understand local conditions, develop sustainable partnerships and act effectively.

Emphasis on quality education

Content-wise, we also have a clear focus: We want to provide young people with access to quality education and training. That is the best investment in their future. We concentrate on disadvantaged marginalized groups like minorities, street children, refugees and rural youth in areas without infrastructure, the poorest of the poor, who would otherwise have no opportunities.

Our role as change agent

We do not create parallel structures and do not take on any tasks the state should fulfill. We see our role as initiating and accelerating change processes. Therefore, we offer bridging courses, exam support and tutoring for needy children, and accompany government schools in the often necessary improvement of teaching quality.

Sustainable and effective

What distinguishes our projects: careful planning and piloting, creative concepts, implementation with local partners involving civil society, effectiveness monitoring and intensive personal supervision by experts.

📍 School programs

Good education is the key to sustainable change. Education prolongs life, reduces child mortality and significantly increases lifetime income. But every second child worldwide still does not learn to read, write and do arithmetic. Childaid Network supports bridge courses and evening schools so that young people can catch up on the basic education they have missed. We accompany about 1,600 government schools in improving the quality of education.

📍 Vocational training

In our project areas, many families are self-sufficient, but agriculture no longer provides enough food for the growing population. Young people are therefore attracted to relatively well-paid jobs as unskilled workers in the large southern cities or abroad. Childaid Network wants to slow down this exodus and therefore promotes the vocational qualification of young people in crafts or other professions that are in demand locally.

📍 Protect children

Child labor, child trafficking and child marriages are on the rise again. Childaid Network supports projects that help children to obtain their rights in cooperation with civil society. We help to reduce child labor as well as early child marriage and aim to integrate children with disabilities as much as possible. All children should go to school. We support children in homes or foster families if the family of origin cannot enable them to develop well. In children's clubs or student parliaments the young people learn more about their rights.

📍 Health promotion

Life expectancy in our project areas is about 20 years below the average in Germany. Children die of preventable diseases, people suffer from malnutrition at an early age. Children who are ill or hungry cannot study well either. Our projects promote children's health through better hygiene, better nutrition and other preventive measures.

Support for preschool children

Early practice

We all know: Children learn from birth. A safe, stimulating environment is important for good development. Science confirms the importance of early stimulation of all senses: if young children are encouraged to explore and understand their environment, learning processes are much easier later on.

Realities of life

The hard life in the village communities in our project regions leaves little room for people to look after the young children. The children in the village are left to fend for themselves when their parents work, often far away. Illnesses are overlooked, nutrition is inadequate and intellectual development is hardly encouraged.

Family is important

To help their children, parents are often tempted to place them in a home or boarding school, especially when there is economic hardship at home. However, integration into family life is irreplaceable, which is why we advise and support the families. We help the village communities to organize qualified early childhood support through preschools, kindergartens, and Montessori centers on a decentralized basis.

What happens next

We now support several hundred preschools and children's centers in rural regions of South Asia – in close cooperation with the local government – and will continue to expand these projects.



Milan

Five-year-old Milan was a shy, reserved child. He frequently missed school, withdrew from group activities, and rarely talked about his experiences. While he communicated well at home, the school environment triggered anxiety and insecurity in him, which was a cause for concern for his family.

Our project “ECD Harmony: Building Bright Beginnings” changed everything. Early childhood education specialist Rita Bohara used child-friendly, play-based methods: group activities, songs, stories, dialogues, and a safe, supportive environment. She gave Milan space to ask questions, contribute his own ideas, and learn through play. Step by step, he opened up, took responsibility for materials, began to actively participate, and developed a love of learning.

Today, Milan regularly attends the center, plays with friends, asks questions, and actively participates in class. His parents say: “Before, Milan was reluctant to talk about school. Now he enthusiastically tells us about what he has learned and played. This change makes us incredibly happy.”

A success story - learning gaps closed

Education emergency

Schools were closed in our project regions for 18 months during the pandemic. This has left a lasting impact. Initially with the support of generous funding partners, and later with federal funds, we were able to close these gaps for many children.

Project with hurdles

Our trusted partner Aide et Action took on the challenge of helping more than 100,000 pupils at 1,000 schools in seven districts. Studies showed that only 7% of these children could read a simple text. Only one in a hundred could perform a simple division.

Success with volunteers

The breakthrough was achieved because our partner trained more than 4,000 local volunteers to provide tutoring. Now more than 85% of the target group can read well. This was achieved with budgets of around €10 per child per year. Everyone is proud of the success.

What is next

This specific program has been completed, but the experience gained is feeding into new projects in neighboring regions.



Gaurav

Before receiving support from our partner Aide et Action, the Doomni Bagan LP School was struggling with declining enrollment, the multi-lingual nature of the children, and low parental involvement. Many girls and boys speak Sadri at home and could barely follow the lessons taught in Assamese.

Thanks to Aide et Action's support, the school was transformed. Engaging lessons with plenty of hands-on activities and playful methods, creative teaching and learning materials, and cultural activities such as Assamese folk songs helped strengthen the children's language skills, pronunciation, and self-confidence. Principal Gaurav consistently implemented the new approaches, encouraged the participation of everyone, conducted home visits and meetings with parents, and thus sustainably expanded community collaboration.

Today, the children attend school with enthusiasm and engage actively in lessons. Through the school magazine "Nahor", they have a platform to share their own stories and poems. Education is visibly becoming an opportunity – and the school has become a true place of learning, culture, and community.

Support, empower, encourage

Shocking learning outcomes

Official statistics show a remarkable school enrollment rate of 97 % in our project areas. This seemingly good news masks other figures: Around 50 % of sixth graders still cannot read simple texts. The main causes are poorly trained teachers and inadequate resources. Often, there are no teachers at all.

Catalyst

Childaid Network cannot and does not want to relieve the state of its responsibility to provide all children with a good education and will not set up parallel systems. We have a catalytic effect, with proven success. We presently support over 1,400 state schools in four countries. In this way, we are improving the quality of education in the long term and are ensuring greater educational equality.

Mobilizing communities

In addition, we strengthen the social environment: we finance social workers, support the parents, and ensure that the children attend school regularly. We organize tutoring and motivating leisure programs. Teachers are supported with further training and better teaching materials.

What is next

Together with Mantra4Change, we are now aiming to scale up our activities to thousands of schools and improve educational quality across entire states by leveraging local budgets.



Sushila Neupane (42) from Mainapokhari, Dolakha, taught English to children in grades three through ten using traditional lecture-style instruction methods. Her days were filled with lesson planning, textbook-based lessons, and standardized tests. Despite her strong commitment, her lessons and pupil engagement often felt monotonous, which left Sushila feeling exhausted and discouraged.

Everything changed with the six-day teacher training program offered by the Rato Bangala Foundation. She learned about creative and low-cost learning materials as well as hands-on activities. Sushila incorporated stories, morning messages, news, and class agreements into her lessons, and kept task and attendance charts. These innovative approaches made learning more exciting.

Today, the school children are more motivated, parents are involved, and the school benefits from the new learning environment. Sushila says, "The training has truly transformed my teaching, brought joy to my pupils' learning, and encouraged me to bring about positive changes in my classroom and school."

Protecting children

Children face growing existential threats

Millions of children worldwide are suffering from the consequences of war and environmental disasters. In 2025 the effects of climate change caused extensive damage in South Asia. Compounding this are civil war-like conflicts with deeply traumatic consequences in parts of our project regions. The younger generation is losing heart. Can education alone be enough?

Emergency situation

In existential emergencies, children are sometimes abandoned, sold, or enslaved. Some parents are helpless and themselves become victims of criminals who profit from their hardship. We know many harrowing examples from our own surveys: Most girls are married off underage and have to work. 95 % of children with disabilities do not go to school.

Changing structures

Our partners identify the problems, look for allies, educate and work towards sustainable structural change. The state is interested in improvements, but often lacks the expertise and budget.

What is next

Our work: securing children's protection, abolishing child labor, integrating young people with disabilities, preventing abduction and child marriage is more important than ever. We are significantly expanding our children's protection projects in Northeast India and Nepal.



Before joining the project, Ranjila was a 9th-grade student and knew little about her rights or the consequences of early marriage. In an emotionally stressful situation, she felt left alone. Running away with an older boy seemed to her like the only way out. But her father refused to let her return—her education and future were seriously jeopardized.

The Child Development Committee (CDC) supported Ranjila and her family with patience and empathy. Through conversations, they explained the health and legal risks of early marriage and strengthened Ranjila's awareness of her rights. They accompanied her on her safe return home and encouraged her to resume attending school regularly.

Today, Ranjila is continuing her education, feels accepted by her family, and looks to the future with hope. In the village understanding of the importance of girls' education has grown. "I was on the verge of losing my future—but the emotional and legal support and education changed everything."

Qualification and income for a better future

Vocational training

In our project areas traditional agriculture no longer feeds everyone. Without special qualifications, young people are often left with odd jobs or labor migration. To improve life chances, we invest in vocational training and entrepreneurship.

Demand-driven

Our courses are geared towards the preferences of young people and the needs of the region. Our decentralized training approach is successful: we go to the villages with mobile teams and equipment. This saves costs and creates new opportunities locally.

Self-employed

Some work as employees after qualifying, but jobs are few and far between. That is why many of our graduates try their hand at small-scale entrepreneurship. We promote this with start-up funding, encourage the formation of cooperatives and offer support with business planning and start-ups.

What is next

We completed our successful large-scale vocational training programs in Assam and Nepal in 2025. Our evaluation showed that we need to increase our collaboration with larger organizations, the government, and businesses in order to achieve even greater success.



Saroj Aalam (24) from southern Nepal grew up in extreme poverty and lost almost all of his eyesight at age 17. With limited mobility and no income of his own, he felt isolated and a burden on his family.

His life changed when representatives of the BRAVE project came to see him. Through home visits, business skills training, and mentoring, Saroj learned how to run a small business on his own. He received a starter kit for his grocery store and was supported as he built his business.

Today, Saroj earns an above-average income, actively participates in family life, and is socially integrated. His store supplies the local community with groceries, and his courage inspires others.

Saroj says: “I want to show others, especially people with disabilities, that it is possible to run your own business and support your family. Don’t lose hope — take small steps, learn, and you can become self-reliant, just like me.”

Health promotion

Health Care is a luxury

In Germany, we offer medical care, health check-ups, support during childbirth, vaccinations and dentistry across the board. For the people in our project areas, this is a luxury. Medical professionals and hospitals are difficult to reach in an emergency due to the distances involved. Local health stations are poorly equipped.

Improving basic care

Our expert analysis of the situation in Ramechhap (Nepal) in 2019 revealed the malnutrition of many children and the widespread prevalence of preventable diseases. Our project concept to fundamentally improve the health situation was quickly implemented and was very important during the pandemic.

Focus on prevention

Even after the pandemic, our local teams are in high demand and are committed to educating people about the risks and prevention of infections. At the request of the government, we are helping health centers throughout Ramechhap to improve their daily work. Preventive healthcare programs are being systematically set up in schools.

What is next

We are integrating key aspects of hygiene and healthy nutrition into an increasing number of programs and are seeking additional partners.



Aloka, 10 years old, is in the 5th grade at the elementary school in Goolni. She used to miss school often because she and her siblings were frequently sick. Her family had little knowledge of health, hygiene, and nutrition, and due to limited financial resources, they lived in unhealthy conditions.

The project “Strengthening Children’s Education in the Tea Garden Region” brought about change. At school, Aloka learned a lot about hygiene, healthy nutrition, and regular preventive care; she participated in health days and received support from her teachers. At home, her parents introduced new rules and began growing seasonal vegetables themselves.

Today, Aloka is stronger and healthier and is able to attend school regularly. Her family pays attention to hygiene and actively participates in health days. Aloka says, “Health is an indispensable part of our lives. Through this project, my family has understood how important it is to strengthen and protect our health.”

Climate change - who pays the price?

„Extreme Wetterlagen werden zunehmen“

Königsstein – Gabe es eine schmerzende Verletzung zwischen dem Königsteiner Kreis und dem Frankfurter Hauptbahnhof, die entsprechende vertikale Ausdehnung jener Zone, in der sich unser Wetter abspielt. Im Durchschnitt 15 Kilometer beträgt die Höhe der Troposphäre, innerhalb deren Niederschläge fallen, sich Wolken bilden, Winde wehen. Gemessen an der Größe des Planeten ist dies eine nur sehr kleine Gasse. Gleichwohl sei es eine beachtliche und sehr sensible Zone, wie Oden Terli im Begleittext seines Vortrags aufbaute. Im letzten Zitatstadium erregt sich und schließt sich ein Wetter, der alle Leben auf der Erde. Diese Funktion kann sie jedoch nach den Worten des Meteorologen „zunehmend schwerer erfüllen. Kein Urteil zum Thema Stadtmitte

„Über 2000 Jahre sehen wir beim Gehalt von Kohlendioxid kaum Veränderungen“, sagte der Wetter- und Klimaforscher. Erst seit der Mensch im Zuge der industriellen Revolution in großen Teil Kohle, Gas und Öl verbrennt, anschauen sich nach neuen Werten „an der Veränderung“ ab. Das so entstehende Kohlendioxid (CO₂) sammelt sich in der Atmosphäre und verändert, das seit etwa 250 Jahren zu verzeichnen, dass sich die Erde erwärmt, hob Terli hervor. „Eine um 2,5 Grad höhere Temperatur reicht aus, das gesamte Wetter- und Klimasystem zu verändern“, sagte er. „An der Konsequenz.“

A successful year

Further growth

At over € 4.46 million (previous year: € 4.42 million), Childaid Network recorded a modest increase in total revenue for 2025, once again approaching the record levels of 2022. Project investments grew at a higher rate than income, resulting in a negative carryover.

Reliable network

The growth in donations reflects a further deepening of trust. Fundraising campaigns mobilized over 32,000 people and generated significantly higher contributions. Commitments for BMZ grants have declined slightly.

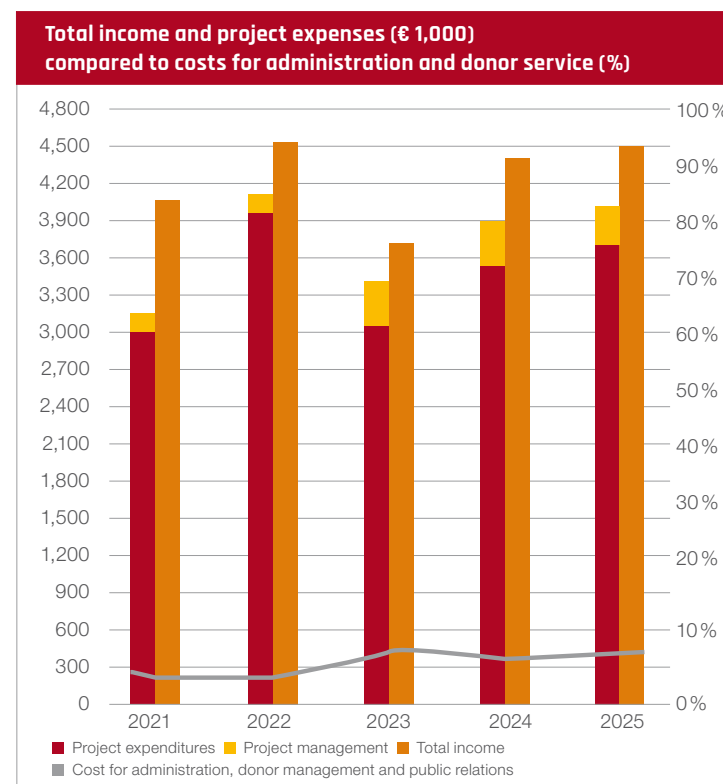
Low costs

The DZI cost ratio for administration, donor relations, and public relations rose modestly to 7.3 % (previous year: 5.9 %), keeping Childaid Network firmly in the top category of highly cost-effective organizations (see also p. 47).

Higher project investments

Program investments in 2025 amounted to € 4.07 million (previous year: € 3.54 million), an increase of approximately 15 %. Project transfers reached a new record high of € 3.9 million, with more than 95 % of all revenue directed to projects.

Strong financial position

With total assets of € 4,508,262.42 as of December 31, 2025 (previous year: € 4,558,256.50), Childaid Network's financial position remains virtually unchanged.

High project liabilities

Liabilities consist primarily of grants from the BMZ received in 2025 which were not invested. Due to delays in project implementation, this amount has risen again.

Endowment capital

The endowment capital remained unchanged.

Supervision and nonprofit status

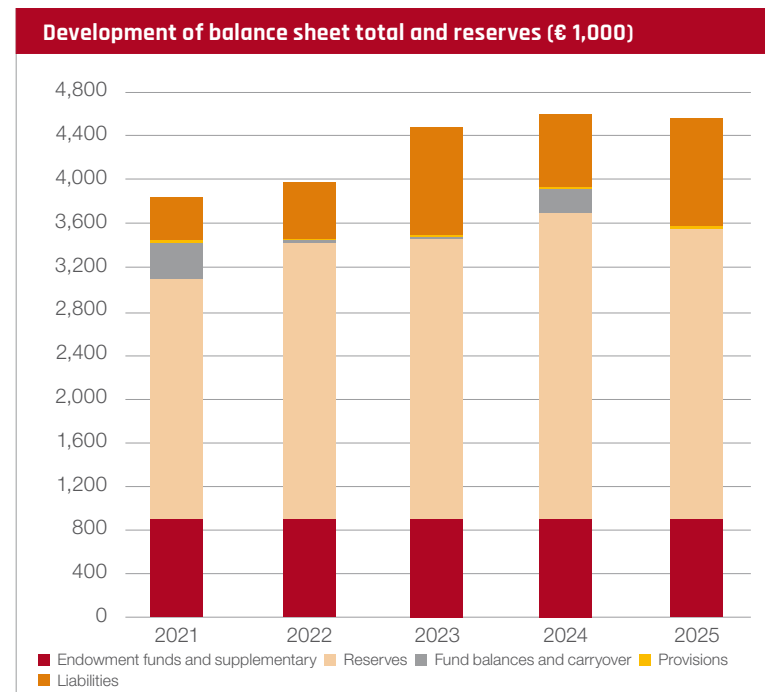
Childaid Network was recognized as a foundation with legal capacity on April 27, 2007, by the Darmstadt Regional Council under reference number AZ I 13 – 25d 04/11(4)-146. The Bad Homburg Tax Office regularly confirms the foundation's non-profit status, most recently on November 17, 2025.

Bylaws

Childaid Network revised its bylaws in 2022. The new version was approved by the Darmstadt Regional Council in early 2023. The changes primarily concern a strengthening of the separation of powers between the Foundation Board and the Executive Board, as well as adjustments to the new foundation law. The new bylaws are available on the website.

Audit of the financial statements

Childaid Network voluntarily submits various external audits. The annual financial statements of the Childaid Network Foundation for the 2025 fiscal year were once again audited by the auditing firm Baker Tilly GmbH & Co. KG, Frankfurt. On April 2, 2026, the firm issued, as in previous years, an unqualified audit opinion. The DZI reviews processes and expenditures annually according to transparent criteria. Upon request, we are happy to send interested parties the audit opinion, the annual financial statements, or the DZI's report. The documents are also available on our website.



Our employees and partners are asked to agree on the following principles:

- compliance with child protection
- corruption-free use of funds
- economical use of resources
- high data security
- honest and transparent reporting

Key figures and analysis

Significant expansion of project work

Project investments increased significantly once again in 2025. Local contributions also grew steadily. In particular, projects for primary and vocational education in Northeast India and Nepal were thus able to expand further. For the first time, the allocated and invested funds for Nepal exceeded those for India.

Wide reach for marginalized groups

Through our four main project pillars – school quality programs, children’s protection, vocational training, and health promotion – hundreds of thousands of young people continue to receive direct or indirect support. We focus particularly on children and adolescents from disadvantaged marginalized groups such as minorities, refugees, and rural youth who would otherwise have no access to education.

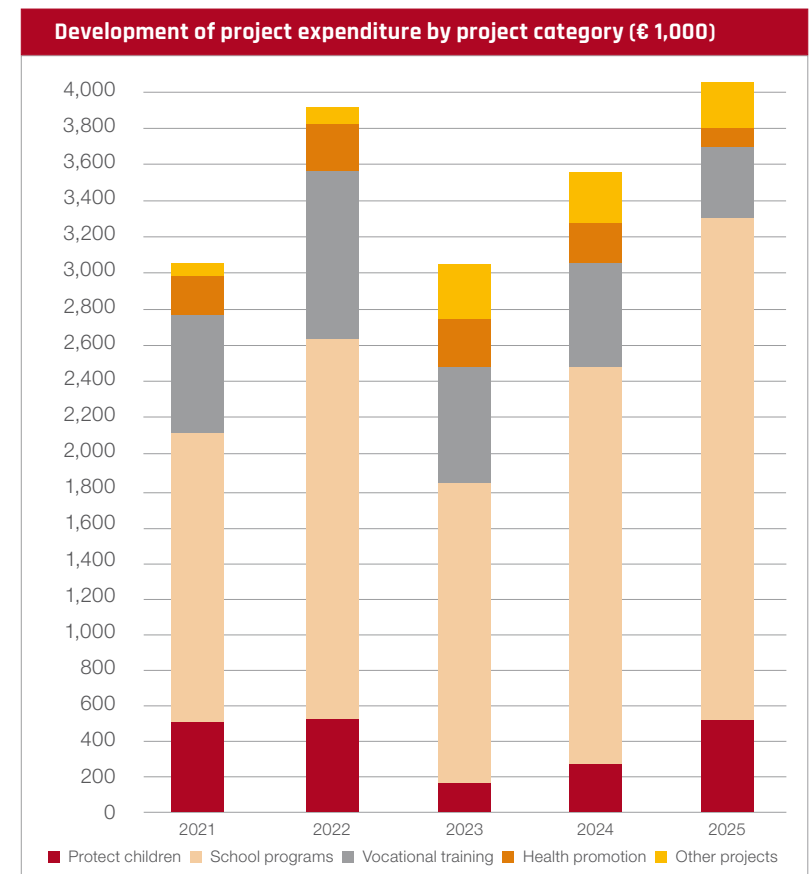

Principles for the use of funds

The vast majority of our funds is used to pay teachers and social workers, as well as for their professional development. We also invest a small portion of the funds in studies, conferences, and professional development for our partners.



Continued – a lean cost structure

Our administrative costs in the reporting year amounted to approximately € 149,000, or 3.3 % of total income (previous year: 2.2 %). Donor relations costs, including public relations, totaled approximately € 180,000, representing 4.0 % of total income (previous year: 3.7 %). Overall, and despite growth in our activities, we spent only 7.3 % of our charitable income on the proper administration and support of our work in accordance with DZI accounting standards (previous year: 5.9 %).

Great honorary commitment

Our costs remain low because our foundation's work continues to be carried out primarily by volunteers. The Executive Board, Foundation Council, editorial team, graphic designers, project coordinators, web designers, and many others fulfill their roles as unpaid experts. A partner company provides us with an office free of charge. Auditors, banks, and suppliers offer us preferential terms. The volunteer team has continued to grow in 2025.

At the same time, we are strengthening our collaboration with international organizations that share our vision.

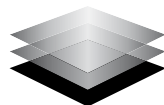
